The Benefits of Longitudinal Data: A Decade of Winnipeg Family Violence Court Statistics

Mapping Gaps: The Postcode Lottery of Access to Support

Women's support services are often critical resources in enabling women to end/deal with the legacies of violence; but many have no/limited access because of where they live. This collaboration between sociologists and geographers developed a new methodology to map the availability (or lack of it) of services across the UK. The visualisation of maps has proved extremely effective in raising awareness among policy makers and politicians.
