Family Violence in Canada: A Statistical Profile 2008

The *Family Violence in Canada* report produced by the Canadian Centre for Justice Statistics under the Federal Family Violence Initiative provides the current data on the nature and extent of family violence in Canada. Considered part of the initiative to inform policy makers and the public about issues, this year, the focus of the report is spousal violence. Data is based on the Incident-based Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR2) survey. Of particular interest to members of the Canadian observatory is the chapter on spousal violence. This chapter examines variations in police-reported spousal violence across Canadian provinces and territories in 2006, as well as trends since 1998. The chapter is based on research that focused on differences in prevalence of police reported spousal violence, variations in the distribution of spousal violence across gender, age, and relationship status, extent of injuries and province or territory of residence, provincial/territorial variations in police charge rates, and trends/changes in police reported spousal violence.
